Drama Australia Conference

- Connection and creativity with our good friends from across the ditch!

On June 1st, Annette Thomson and I flew and took the train to beautiful Newcastle, New South Wales, ready for the Drama Australia National Conference early the next morning.



The conference was based at the University of Newcastle's stunning and architecturally designed city campus: Nuspace. It was an exciting, two days of events, under the title of ANTIDOTE, which aimed to open up space for sharing innovative drama practice and research and act as a creative remedy for the challenging circumstances of our times.

Annete and I presented on the second day of the conference, our presentation was titled: Baskets of hope and inspiration. Working together to thrive in our drama communities. Annette asked the question: how can we change the dialogue in our schools and institutions. She explored the Drama NZ advocacy 'basket', and shared ideas to value the work of drama in our classrooms and beyond. Annette also looked at the Drama New

Zealand response to crises in our communities such as the recent cyclones, the Christchurch earthquake and terror attack. and how drama can bring us back to hopeful connection and learning.

Meanwhile I, as a practitioner in secondary and tertiary education, examined drama pedagogy as a vehicle for health and wellbeing. I used a range of resources from the Health and Wellbeing 'basket' to show delegates how to integrate them with their daily practice in the classroom. I also spoke how recently I've been exploring big ideas such as sustainability and climate justice and devising with students creating 'Drama for change'. I shared how I ensure students are safely supported to discuss and develop these concepts in a drama context. I also provided a basket of tips on how teachers can look after themselves, so that they are prepared to support their students.

Through our presentation, we made it clear that Drama New Zealand believes that drama is an antidote to our changing world and we were bringing our baskets of hope and inspiration to Australia to share with them all.

Highlights from the weekend for me were the inspiring keynotes, especially Professor Stacy Holman Jones' one (from Monash University): Feminist Strategies and Tactics: Staging Australian Women's Lives and Radical Creative Praxis as well as the closing one from Professor Daniel X.Harris (RMIT): Cure. Remedy. Fix: Dramatic antidote urgently needed!



I also loved the session with Andrew Byrne on Teaching contemporary First Nations theatre in the drama and theatre classroom. Andrew has undertaken a phenomenological study of six drama teachers who have engaged with scripts by First Nations playwrights in their drama and theatre classrooms. I especially enjoyed his clips from several different productions of 'Black Medea', blending the cultures of Ancient Greek and Indigenous storytelling,

Highlights for Annette included Jo Raphael and Meg Upton's workshop, "Time to Act' for climate justice – Drama and the art of 'futuring'" which explored climate change through dramatic inquiry. Annette was also inspired by the work of Richard Sallis, Chris Summers and Prue Wales who demonstrated effectively how they are using artefacts (such as phone photos) as a stimulus to create contemporary research-based theatre.

A special moment was watching our NZ colleague Gaenor Brown present her paper: "Activating Belonging: Towards a critical ensemble pedagogy" - Gaenor is completing her PHD on ensemble work and we can't wait to

see the fruition of her research, such important mahi for our Drama community.



All in all, the national Drama Australia Conference was a very worthwhile experience for both Annette and I. We left Newcastle feeling that our cups were full, we were grateful for connecting with old friends, and also making new ones. A huge thanks to Drama Australia and the Conference Committee for being such fantastic hosts. We very much look forward to connecting with you all next year in Aotearoa at our combined conference! Ngā mihi maioha.



Advocating for Drama

Our President has submitted a response to the threatened cuts of the Theatre Programme at Victoria University, Pōneke, Wellington. President Annette Thomson submitted the following letter to the Chancellor, John Allen, and Vice Chancellor, Nick Smith, on behalf of Drama New Zealand to advocate against these proposed cuts. The following is part of the letter. If you would like to make your own submission go to this link for further details.



Kia ora Chancellor John Allen,

Drama New Zealand is the subject association that advocates for and supports Drama educators throughout the sectors from Early Childhood through Secondary, into Tertiary and industry associates. We have been made aware of the threatened cuts to the Theatre Programme at Victoria University Wellington. We understand the programme is set to lose significant staff and the programme will be merged with English. Drama New Zealand is deeply concerned about the loss that these cuts will generate throughout Aotearoa.

The theatre programme has been established over many years. Building world class Theatre programmes do not happen instantly. They are nurtured and built with links to local, national and international educators, industries and people. To cut this department will destroy the work that has been done in the past and damage future possibilities. Our recent conference Ka Mua Ka Muri highlighted the importance of past programmes in Aotearoa such as the Victoria Theatre programme which helps to inform, inspire and develop excellence in the arts for the future. Drama teachers all over Aotearoa know of the Theatre programme at Victoria and will send students there who are wishing to pursue a career in the arts. But we also know of the power of collaboration and how Theatre works in conjunction with other areas, students doing double major degrees coming out with exceptional degrees because the Theatre major will give them the creativity and collaboration skills that give students the edge. Many students have combined Theatre with for example law, psychology or business because they realise the value of embodied knowledge and the creativity, collaboration, project management, empathy and communication skills that theatre gives them.

Wellington's local theatre and film community as well as Aotearoa's arts scene would be devastated in future years if the Victoria theatre department were to close.

These are areas that are generally undervalued within tertiary institutions. When staff cuts are employed to save money it is nonsensical that cuts are made in areas that are already fighting for recognition. The research is clear that the arts are an essential part of a well rounded education, and they are vital in forward thinking universities. For the long term diversity and prosperity of an institution there must be healthy representation across all learning pathways.

Drama New Zealand represents members across the education sector and arts industries. Many of our members have gained their first degree in the Theatre programme at Victoria University. By cutting the exceptional, world-recognised Theatre programme at Victoria University and the Secondary Teaching programme you will be destroying years of vital mahi, collaborative links with other programmes of learning and damaging vital pathways for future arts makers, and teachers in Aotearoa.

Primary Conference Update

We are just so excited about the upcoming Whakamana, Mana Reo conference. So many kaiako from across the motu and as far away as China and the UK are joining us for the second of this series of conferences highlighting the powerful connection between drama and literacy learning, with strong links to ANZHC and reconnecting through the Arts post-trauma.

Highlights will include Professor Julie Dunn's keynote address 'Stand up for Literacy', focussing on bringing together cognition, emotion and the body. Julie will draw upon recent international research studies to support an understanding of why it is that the elements and structures of drama are so effective in supporting literacy learning, the modes of literacy that are most positively influenced, and the specific approaches and strategies that are applicable for children of different ages. New Zealand's newly appointed Te Awhi Rito (reading ambassador) will be sharing his insights into literature for positive mindsets and wellbeing along with his process of getting started with story writing. Many classroom kaiako will be sharing their own journeys of using drama in their literacy program - the pitfalls and perfect teachable moments.

We are blessed to be joined by students from Project Prima Volta in a lunchtime soundbite and Rangatahi from the Hawke's Bay Youth Theatre will be joining us throughout as our guides and helpers. Also on hand will be students from Poukawa School coming along to help teacher Jane Speers, demonstrate what happens in her class daily.

Whakamana, Mana Reo 2, follows the very successful 2019 conference of the same name, supported by the then Teachers' Refresher Course Committee (TRCC) which was founded

by Dr Clarence Beeby in 1945 developed to enable teachers to have a voice in their own learning and to ensure opportunities for professional development 'for teachers, by teachers'. We are thrilled and honoured to be continuing this tradition.





Julie Dunn is co-author of "Pretending to Learn: Drama in the Primary and Middle Years" & "Stand up For Literature" with John O'Toole. As a researcher, Julie's focus has been on drama work that sits at the nexus between play and drama, in settings as diverse as early childhood classrooms and aged care facilities. Julie's most recent research has been concerned with the role of emotion, particularly in process drama.

Keynote presentation: Stand up for Literacy!

A facilitated conversation with Juliet Cottrell, discussing the role which drama can play in supporting children's literacy development. With a focus on bringing together cognition, emotion and the body, Julie will draw upon recent international research studies to support an understanding of why it is that the elements and structures of drama are so effective in supporting literacy learning, the modes of literacy that are most positively influenced, and the specific approaches and strategies that are applicable for children of different ages.

WORKSHOP: Exploring the strategies and structures of the Giant Who Threw Tantrums Early Years Drama

This process drama, which is included on the Te Rito Toi website, has been taught extensively in early childhood classrooms across the world, and is known for its capacity to support both social emotional development and literacy skills (particularly oral language). A key feature of this drama is that it includes opportunities for children to engage with miniature world and socio-dramatic play - opportunities which are critical in the early childhood drama context. Participants will not only participate in the drama, but will also learn how to re-imagine literature for use in the planning of drama sequences.



WORKSHOP: Adapting existing stories to make a play.

A workshop that takes teachers through a process of working with their students to adapt a story already written, and retelling in their own voices.

WORKSHOP: **Exploring science fiction** through drama

An exploration of the short science fiction text The Machine Stops by EM Forster through drama- and literacy-based tasks, suitable for Year 7-8, and sophisticated Year 6, learners. Students can relate the isolated society of 'The Machine' to their personal experiences of time spent in lockdown, as well as explore the development of technology from the early 1900s to today, and Forster's projections of a future, dystopian society. Learning experiences complement the teaching of explanation texts and/or science fiction narratives, and 'how the world works.' Lesson plan includes opportunities to explore rich vocabulary and figurative language.

The resource, This is Where I Stand by Philippa Werry and Kieran Rynhart has themes of past, present and future. There are many versions of this pūrākau and I bring to you this one from the most southern part of Aotearoa. "Why do the whanau at Awarua want to keep these pūrākau alive? What can we learn from them?"

WORKSHOP: Mana Moments

I was enlightened by a speaker in a conference some years ago who asked us how many famous Māori we knew about? Who of them were included in school programmes? What did we remember from our schooling about Māori who are significant in our history. This led me to work on Mana Moments. This drama looks at some of those indigenous kiwis who have been notable in contributing to the history of Aotearoa New Zealand. The drama will develp a living installation that when used in schools could be shared with others.




Visit from Anna Richardson

Plays for Students from Playmarket

Māori plavs:

The Undertow series by Helen Pearse-Otene Published

- The Ragged (4-7f, 9-13m, 15-15 any) Newly arrived settlers, escaping an oppressive Victorian England, are finding the Crown's fingers stretch all the way to this wild, distant land and they are still stuck on the bottom rung. Samuel Kenning has arrived "safe and well at the ends of the earth," ready to claim his land and his better life. He quickly learns, however, that the life and land he has purchased from the New Zealand Company wasn't theirs to give.
- Dog & Bone (5f, 8m, 4-10 any) It's 1869 at the bottom of the world the British Army has gone and left Māori and Pākehā to fight it out. The Māori kurī, like its master, an inferior, ugly, savage animal not to be given an inch... or a bone.
- Public Works (2f, 3m, 5-10 any) 1918 and home calls to our boys in No Man's Land – the space in between, where anything is possible – in life, in death, O Lord, abide with me. Dumb, black bastards stuck in the mud. Theirs or someone else's, it's all the same.
- The Landeaters (2f, 4m, 15-25 any) Entangled in the roots of a beloved willow tree – where the ancient ones reside – somewhere just between today and tomorrow an old man and his roots are digging in against The Landeaters.

The Prophet by Hone Kouka (3f. 3m)

Five teenage cousins have returned to their 'home' on the East Coast for another cousin's unveiling (headstone ceremony). Over the three days there, they deal with the new roles they must accept as adults.

With the backdrop of basketball, cool urban sounds and the beautiful East Coast, *The Prophet* is moving, funny and definitely unforgettable.

Awhi Tapu by Albert Belz (1f, 3m)

At the foot of the Urewera ranges lies Awhi Tapu – a desolate forestry village. With the forestry industry closed down, the people of Awhi Tapu have left. Wendyl, Sonny, Casper and Girl Girl have only each other to rely on. Awhi Tapu is a story of loss, belonging but most of all friendship

Purapurawhetū by Briar Grace-Smith (2f, 3m)

The town of Te Kupenga has been tainted by a tragedy that happened 30 years ago. Tyler is an outsider who wants to fit in. As Tyler helps weave the tukutuku panel for the new wharenui, new faces and old demons haunt Te Kupenga. Tyler must weave together the secrets of the past in order to save his town from collapsing all over again... *Published*

Plays from Realm Nations:

Sunset Road by Mīria George (1f, 2m)

Set in Rotorua and the Cook Islands, Sunset Road is a dramatic coming-of-age story. It's two days before twins Luka and Lucia finally cross in to adulthood. Free, they roam the steam filled streets of Rotorua on Luka's trusty Bonneville and dream of taking on the world. Luka desperate to escape, Lucia to become Miss Geyserland. The twins work with their devout father at the local sawmill, uninspiring to them, where he has been since he first brought his family to this dry and broken land. A near death experience drags father back to memories of Atiu, Cook Islands and the secrets and mistakes of his past, shaking the family's foundations and ultimate love of each other.

Kaveinga by Teherenui Koteka (3f, 3m) Shortlisted for Playwrights b4 25 Competition Set on the Cook Islands atoll of Manihiki, Eturere and her family are forced to piece together their lives in the aftermath of cyclone Martin. While her people would once have found this task simple, climate change has evoked new challenges. Papa, a personification of mother earth attempts to guide Eturere and her people in the rebuild. However, the people of Manihiki fall into further turmoil as they reject Papa's teachings. Desperation drives Eturere and her family to an unreasonable conclusion that results in a gut wrenching demise. Kaveinga (a new direction) urges the Cook Islands people to reflect upon their contributions to climate change and challenges all to make a change.



Magic Moments – Thorrington Literacy Project, by Sam Bates

A couple of magic moments stood out to me during the Phase 2 drama and literacy project at Thorrington Primary School in Christchurch last term. Their deep learning theme was sustainability and we explored this through dramatic contexts in the story of Rātā and the waka and imaginary scenarios relating to the school environment.

Over the course of the project, the teacher's confidence in using drama in the classroom grew in leaps and bounds. They had lots of opportunities to practice teacher in role as: a morepork whose tree had been cut down, Rātā asking for forgiveness from the forest creatures and a present day construction worker. It was so wonderful to see the teachers being playful and creative with their teaching, using their imagination and engaging their students in the learning.

There were many magic moments offered by the Year 3 and 4 students also. When the students were in role as the forest creatures, and the morepork (teacher in role) had asked them if they would help her to resurrect her fallen totara tree, they decided they needed to say a karakia or chant as they raised the tree together in order to protect the tree and make it strong again. These are 2 different examples created by 2 different classes. They chanted these words as they collectively raised 2 long lengths of green fabric off the floor and tied them together symbolising fixing the broken tree:

"Keep the tree, keep it safe, make all the leaves and the bark in its rightful place."

> "Izzy wizzy, let's get busy! Long live the tree!All hail the tree!"

Students in role as the forest creatures had also written messages to Rātā expressing their concern at the way he had cut down the tree. Each class decided to leave these messages for Rātā (teacher in role) to read in a different way. One class wrote their messages on paper thin 'bark' and stuck them to the



tree with 'spiders webs'. Another class wrote their messages on 'leaves' and asked a kereru (student in role) to deliver them to a hollow in the tree.

On the last session of the project, I was taken by surprise at another magic moment. The students were in role as the forest creatures who had forgiven Rātā for his mistake. The students were spread around the room grouped in freeze frames offering Rātā gifts to take on his journey. One group was in charge of holding the green fabric symbolising the waka they had fashioned from the tree and offered to Rātā. When it came time for Rātā (teacher in role) to accept the waka, the whole class spontaneously gathered around the piece of fabric. I sat back and watched this magic moment unfold. Many children freely offered some advice or well wishes to Rātā "We forgive you" "Remember this day"... "We wish you well on your journey"... "Remember to only take what you need"... "Use the trees wisely"... "We made this waka is for you"...

Then one child invited everyone to chant as they offered the waka to Rātā.

"Izzy wizzy lets get busy! All hail the tree! Long live the tree!"



Winter Time With Dramatic Inquiry

A week after the conference in Rotorua I was privileged to attend the *Try This* workshop with Viv Aitken and Tim Taylor (UK) and the Dramatic Inquiry Trust Winter School.

The *Try This* workshop was a practical day of exploring the new book *Try This* written by Tim Taylor and Viv Aitken. What is lovely about this book is it is a practical series of Dramatic Inquiry 'keys' that unlock the imagined world for ākonga and Kaiako. Throughout, there are clear set out sequences for each 'key' and examples from both the UK (Tim's experiences) and Aotearoa (Viv's experiences). The examples help to illustrate how the keys are used in context. *Try This* is a practical and useful book for the Primary classroom, although I can see it easily being used with Secondary and Community groups in many ways. The winter school run by the Dramatic Inquiry Trust was held in Kirikiriroa, Hamilton and was two days of inspiration from masters of the pedagogy of Mantle of the Expert. Initially we worked together as a group on a dramatic inquiry using a NZ context. At times, dividing up for Viv Aitken to take a foundational planning group, Whakaronga Tauranga to take a group on effective teaching with Mantle, and Tim Taylor explored Mantle theory and practice.

Over the three days I was able to connect with practitioners who actively have mantle of the expert being explored as pedagogy throughout their kura and was inspired by the inspirational learnings with Viv, Tim and Whakarongo. I was also able to award Viv Aitken with our 2022 Presidents Award (awarded by Emma Bishop 2022). A well deserving recipient of this special award.

Book Review

The Red Leap Devising Toolkit by Julie Nolan Reviewed by Annette Thomson



Julie Nolan remarks at the beginning of this book that "Theatre is about the ethos of collaboration, of empowerment, of that constant desire to improve. It is about telling stories in a voice we don't always hear". Kaiako in classrooms across

Aotearoa empower students to create and tell their stories. This book is a practical toolbox of ideas and ways of working that enable the devising process. Red Leap has been creating devised works since 2008. Their work has pushed boundaries, made us think as audience members and has celebrated inclusive stories.

Recently I was asked to work with a group of year twelve students for two weeks. With the knowledge that they were going on to devise after the two weeks and on the purchase of this book at the Drama NZ conference, I dove in. With no hiding the fact we were working from this book, I read out treasured statements, ways of working and we explored creating theatre through Red Leap's kaupapa.

At the beginning we created a contract as Red Leap does – and I asked the question, "If we were a team of devisors how would we work together as a company? (Ngā mihi to Mantle of the Expert training!) This began a great discussion on how the students usually work together in the classroom but shifted the frame to 'but if we were expert devisors how would we be?' And through this book they could see visually (beautifully illustrated past theatrical works are shown) and through text how Red Leap work as a professional company. Our contract was unique to us but the students really thought about the difference between students in a classroom and a professional devising company and our contract reflected this shift in how they now wanted to

work together.

The students and I explored 'A classic Red Leap Day' and the chapters on 2) The Joy of Games 3) Ensemble building 4) Quick Fire devising and 5) Provocations provided inspiration to try new things.



It was lovely to explore together where I as teacher was not the imparter of expertise - the book and red leap became the expert here - we learnt together. We particularly enjoyed rediscovering grandmother's keys and walking in space. We tried out some new ways of working with 'Elementals' and 'Flipped perspectives" laughing hysterically at 'climbing a cliff' on the floor. There is a lot more to discover here - with building character, (chapter 6), developing scenes (chapter 7), towards production and reflection (chapter 8 and 9) more than we could do in two weeks. This book is incredibly valuable for the classroom teacher to delve into for a time, to discover a new game or devising provocation or to build a comprehensive plan of working with ākonga to realise a fully devised piece of work. I highly recommend this for Drama educators working within secondary tertiary and community kura. Red Leap has given drama educators a Devising Toolkit that is practical, accessible and useful for the classroom.
