In 1968, "Takiora" Lord returns to her turangawaewae to work alondsige the militia of the Taranaki Land Wars. Fiercely independent and ambitious, Lucy is living a life outside of the social expectations for women of the time. She is determined to define her place to stand, on her terms. But, at what cost?

Kūpapa takes us into the complex world of first-generation Māori/Pākeha wāhine who lived out their extraordinary lives creating their own agency in the birth of this "New" Zealand.

Why should you send your students to Kapapa?

- The show is fantastic for all secondary students- in particular drama, history and te reo Māori students years 9 - 13.
- A great way to celebrate and promote Matariki with kaupapa Māori theatre that acknowledges tupuna.
- An insight into New Zealand History, specifically the political context of Kororāreka and the Taranaki Wars through, sharing the complexities of early colonial NZ, from a not often heard perspective of the kūpapa.
- Written by and starring Nicola Kawana, directed by Erina Daniels and designed by Jane Hakaraia; this is an exceptional group of wāhine Māori coming together to give voice to Māori women in this nation's history.



Primary Drama and Literacy Pilot NOE Update:


Tēnā koutou katoa,

This term Juliet Cottrell has been busy mentoring teachers in a continuation of our project, with Phase Two teachers creating their own dramas and Phase One teachers being brought into the project in our cluster schools. We are drawing near to the end of this phase. Just this week students and teachers across many classrooms in Wellington and Hawkes Bay; signed a treaty, built a boat from objects lying around the hall with prison cells and wrote letters from inside, met Agatha Rose and agreed to help her remember, wrote a script whilst travelling from Mars, created a space lab and heard from a child in outer space, received mail from a giant, burnt some words in a bowl and performed a significant story for a buddy class.

Teachers are currently gathering data on changes in outcomes in their student's writing and will be reporting on this in Week 11. We thank the teachers and schools that have been part of this Phase Two project. We appreciate their mahi, ability to be risk takers and the way they have embraced this project.

TOUR-MAKERS IS BACK IN 2021

This April/May will see the return of Tour-Makers on the road with the exciting and powerful, *Meremere*, in partnership with *Movement of the Human*. Like many arts organisations around New Zealand, due to Covid-19, and uncertainty around alert changing levels, PANNZ (Performing Arts Network of New Zealand), which operates Tour-Makers, made the difficult decision to cancel much of its planned activity for 2020.

Meremere has toured previously to much acclaim, but the company is looking forward to meeting audiences once again. The show is a unique autobiographical work from the critically acclaimed performer Rodney Bell (Ngāti Maniapoto) with live music composed by Eden Mulholland, and performed by his brother Jol. Rodney is renowned for his physically integrated performance. In 2007, he joined AXIS Dance Company (USA) as principal dancer for five years. Before his return home, Rodney experienced a period of homelessness on the streets of San Francisco, a life changing experience that inspired the creation of Meremere. In August last year, Drama NZ hosted an online Meet the Makers session with the creatives behind <u>Tu Meke Tūī! Live On Stage</u> which was due to tour in the October school holidays, however Auckland's second sudden lockdown unfortunately forced the tour to be abandoned at that time. Tour-Makers is very happy to report that *Tu Meke Tūī!* Live On Stage will be back on tour later this year, and tickets for this show as well as *Meremere* are now on sale at <u>tourmakers.co.nz</u>.

Supported by Creative New Zealand, PANNZ also had the opportunity to partner with RNZ to create audio drama recordings of three works scheduled to tour in 2020. These high-quality recordings were intended to offer more kiwis access to artistic excellence, while supporting artists in the creation of new avenues for their work in the wake of Covid. The first, Wild Dogs Under My Skirt was broadcast on 7 March and hosted on demand on RNZ's website for three weeks following. A behind the scenes video of the making of the audio drama can be found here.

Next up, on Sunday 2 May at 3pm, will be A Boy Called Piano, in partnership with Wellington Pasifika theatre company, The Conch. Building on the company's kaupapa of harnessing the power of theatre as a force for social change, this powerful work takes us directly into the experience of thousands of Māori and Pacific children placed in state care in the 1960s. Director, Nina Nawalowalo ONZM, leads an 8-strong cast for this audio recording made up of three generations of the Luafutu family to tell Fa'amoana John Luafutu's story.

Following their highly successful 2019 national tour of Mr Red Light, theatre company Nightsong will revisit their award-winning production of Te Pō, that captured the hearts and minds of audiences in 2016 in the third of our audio drama broadcasts on Sunday 27 June at 3pm. The play will celebrate the centenary of extraordinary New Zealand playwright, Bruce Mason's birth, as Te Pō reimagines some of his most memorable characters in an extremely funny and moving drama. The recordings of A Boy Called Piano and Te Pō will be available to listen to, on-demand, on RNZ's website for two weeks following their broadcast dates.





Peter is a very gifted actor who will always be genuinely interested in exploring his work and finding new approaches to it, and opening this out to his fellow actors.




