

A Superb Classroom Resource

A must in my toolbox are Rory's Story Cubes, a pocket-sized creative story generator consisting of a collection of nine dice with images printed on each side of the dice. Rory's Story Cubes are available from Whitcoulls, PaperPlus, Mighty Ape and Amazon. Also available as a board game.



ACTIVITY ONE:

One Minute Challenge: the group shakes the dice and throws. They then have one minute to tell a story using all the face up dice.

ACTIVITY TWO:

Action Dice: Standing in a circle - students throw a dice and must mime the action to the group ensuring their mime technique is refined and clear. The group must work out what their action is.

ACTIVITY THREE:


Short scenes: In small groups of 3-4 students select three dice and have five mins to create a scene using at least one face of each dice within their scene

ACTIVITY FOUR:

Re Sequence. Complete Activity Three then resequence the dice used and see what happens to the scene. After all, do all scenes need to be linear?

ACTIVITY FIVE

Rolling Story. Get students to sit in a circle facing each other. You start with "Once Upon a Time there was a ..." and you roll one dice and then complete the sentence. Another student picks a different cube and then continues the story.



On the 21st July over 20 teachers gathered at Saint Kentigern Girls' School for our second Auckland Drama NZ Primary workshop for the year, based on 'Silly Billy', by Anthony Browne. This was a fantastic turnout with whole teams of teachers coming from some schools. We began with warm up activities to energize everyone on a cold winter's afternoon, before exploring the text. The teachers delved into Billy's world, creating his room, exploring why he might worry and looking at multiple perspectives in the story; Billy, his family and even the worry dolls. Participants responded positively and enthusiasm to the workshop, had also had some laughs along the way. They commented on how the unit successful incorporated a range of curriculum areas, including literacy opportunities. They also liked the way it tackled a subject that students could identify with; worries and anxiety, giving them the opportunity to share their experiences and empower them to develop strategies to face their fears. It was a great opportunity to meet and network with other teachers, refresh drama skills for some and for others, develop their knowledge of process drama.

Supported by Gabrielle Reid our regional rep she said "It was great to see the participants

We had a collaborative workshop on exams to start the afternoon followed by afternoon tea - then a stage combat workshop with Chris and Scott Cheesman and Dave Millar followed by Drinks and nibbles.

We then held our 2019 Canterbury Branch AGM with Guest Speaker Vanessa Wells.

Vanessa is a filmmaker, presenter, voice over artist, actor and improvisor. She has recently

been down to Antarctica as part of Elanti Media where she got to hang out with penguins and create.

Vanessa Wells worked in the arts industry for almost 20 years. She has a long history as a performer with the Court Theatre, from main stage (The Streaker) to various kids shows, and

Vanessa gave us a talk on her life and specifically about telling stories. She encouraged us to not only teach students to love telling stories but also be able to hear them and be able to recognise the stories in all of us.

Dr Viv Aitken, our academic advisor, attended as well. They all had a marvellous morning together. Juliet was commended for her mentorship of the teachers and they had all been clearly very inspired by what they've been doing. The teacher reflections were intelligent, thoughtful, and showed gains in their knowledge over the term's drama work with Juliet. Teachers observed growth in students, especially students who have previously struggled to participate and contribute. Engaging these students through drama has given them a voice. Teachers were energised in their teaching practise and saw the creativity energy drama brought into their classrooms.

We are looking forward to extending this programme next year. We are currently analysing the data received from the pilot and looking at exciting possibilities for this project in the future.



Engaging Learners Through Drama –

Whakamana, Mana Reo

This course, for NE-Year 8 and ECE teachers, will explore creative ways to engage children in a rich variety of language learning using drama.

Drama draws on children's experience, their culture, their whanau, and their love of exploration and play. It is a text rich learning area that brings together multiple literacies and modern learning practices. Research shows drama boosts literacy including writing.

At this course there will be opportunities to learn about:

- developing strategies to improve children's listening, speaking, and social learning;
- using drama processes to support literacy learning;
- fostering whakamana and capability to learn;
- stimulating children's creativity and love of story;
- challenging children to ask questions and think critically about the world around them;
- the experience of drama as an active way of learning;
- extending children's natural artistry and imaginative play.



New plays

The Fifty Percent Party by Helen Varley Jamieson. (4-28f) This play now comes with a comprehensive study resource. As part of a school project, three teenage girls decide to create a women's political party, called The Fifty Percent Party, with the mission of equality.

The Warrior Virgin by Tessa Duder. (19 plus chorus) Prized New Zealand young adult writer Tessa Duder's play about Joan of Arc is now available with us for license. Joan's story has been transported into a dystopian future where the effects of global warming are taking their toll.

World by Elspeth Tilley (9 plus chorus, flexible gender and cast size)

'World' is a typical New Zealand suburban supermarket that is due to close. But the livelihoods of the people that work there could be saved if the workers join together to become a workers' co-operative. This play was one of six finalists selected from almost 250 entries in the 2019 Fratti-Newman Political Play contest sponsored by Castillo Theatre in the heart of New York City's theatre district. The goal of the competition is to encourage the writing of progressive plays that engage the political/social/cultural questions affecting the world today.

They Are Us by Susan Battye (12-42) This new play is about the events surrounding the mosque shootings earlier this year. It is written in reportage style, with much of the text being verbatim speeches and reports.

What's hot in schools around the country

Inky Pinky Ponky by Leki Jackson-Bourke and 'Amanaki Prescott-Faletau (6f, 5m) It's ball season and hormones are on the rise at St. Valentines High. The new arrival of the fabulous fakaleiti Lisa causes a stir and she falls head over heels in love with First XV captain Mose. As love blooms, Lisa soon realises that behind every Prince Charming is a hater in their midst. Published in Talanoa – Four Pacific Plays.

Lifetime by Angie Farrow (1f, 1m) An experimental physical theatre play about a couple who compress a lifetime of marital living into an absurdly short timeframe. It is a commentary on love and forgetting and breaks new ground with its use of theatrical effects, physicality and compressed dialogue. *Published in* Falling and other short plays.

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

Kete Aronui, Auckland's new arts hub for the creative industries was officially opened on August 17th with a blessing by Matua Alec Tairua.

Invited guests participated in the walk through as all the rooms and spaces were blessed and following that every-

one gathered in one of the rooms for the speeches.

Chair of He Waka Eke Noa Charitable Trust, David Clendon, spoke of the journey of the Trust to this point. He recalled the nearly 14 years of work that had been done before this to open a space that was accessible and warm, welcoming and practical. He acknowledged Foundation North as the key supporter of the project. They had granted the Trust funding towards lease costs making it possible for the Trust to open the doors with a minimised risk.

After the short speeches a beautiful afternoon tea was laid on by the Trust, put together by The Food Creative. It was a work of art in itself.



The doors unofficially opened on June 1st when the Trust took over the lease of 80 Onehunga Mall, and since then over 1300 hours of bookings have been made, demonstrating that the need was there. With around 45% of the bookings coming from south Auckland, the west follows with around 30%. The mixture of dance, theatre, improv and bands makes for a creative space representing a multi tudes of ethnicities including Pakeha, Maori, Chinese, Indian, African, Filipino, Romanian and Argentinian.

Executive Director of He Waka Eke Noa, Richard Green, is thrilled with how the bookings have gone so far.

"We need a lot more to make it viable, and hope the arts community will support in to the future so Kete Aronui remains past its funding"

There are five rehearsal rooms, ten hot desks and two small meeting rooms. All spaces have free WiFi and there are two kitchens in the space. The venue has tables, chairs and catering equipment available for groups that require it.

Lion Foundation have just notified the venue of funding towards mirrors in two of the rooms.

Until January 2020 the rehearsal rooms are being hired out at \$5.00 +gst per hour (minimum 4 hours). Hot desks are \$5.00 per day.
