This newsletter comes to you from deep within lockdown. I keep thinking about all of the words and phrases that have popped up in the last few weeks. 'Bubble'. 'Social distancing'. 'Physical Distancing'. all these new terms are really interesting but at the moment there are some prelockdown words that sum up the situation so much more.

The first is **change.** Things have changed so much. We're currently looking at how we adapt our teaching and work distanced and online. All the while we have families to care for, be they children or dependent elders. It takes two hours to go to the supermarket so something that has always been so simple now takes up a major chunk of the day. Something as simple and inexpensive as flour is now a precious commodity. In this newsletter and through a number of different initiatives, we're doing our best to help you adapt and make your way back to the classroom and regain some sense of normality.

But that's in a cloud of **uncertainty.** And change is something that we are all Ok with, but the last few weeks have created a real sense of anxiety as things have changed so quickly and with no real reassurance that we'll return to the status quo within any kind of defined timeframe. Sure, Aunty Cinda said 4 weeks, and it looks like big goals will be achieved by then; but then

what? And what's worse is that our students have to be considered in all of the reassurances; and I'm busy trying to figure out what the best use of my final 1/3 cup of flour will be while trying to keep in touch with my 94 year old Grandmother who lives on her own, on another island. We've done our best over the last month to make decisions quickly, like cancelling conference, which meant a whole lot of hard work, money and opportunity just disappeared. However, we wanted you to have some certainty in what would happen in your holidays and reassure you that you could stay with your whānau and not travel.

But amongst this is an overwhelming sense of **community.** Whenever we've asked for help with resources, people have put their hands up and shared what they've thought, made or found. You'll read more about the workshops and online Zooms that are being offered later in the newsletter. And even though we can't be at conference, we're going ahead with our 2020 AGM. While we don't have the impetus of Conference bringing us together, this is an opportunity to potentially have every DNZ member attend the AGM, in a way that hasn't been attempted before.

So stay safe. Stay home. Stay true to however you feel and need to work over the coming time. But most of all, stay connected.

Little Dog Barking Theatre has cancelled all performances until it becomes clearer what is to happen in the future. During the lock down we are working on preparations to return to early childhood centres, kindergartens and lower primaries, a lot depends on future reactions from these centres

A school Holiday season in July at Circa Theatre of a brand new work "The White Tree" is yet to be confirmed whether it will go ahead or not.

A wonderful piece of theatre that uses puppetry, magic, animation and projection. The main theme of the work is hope and conservation. Set in a world inhabited by birds The White Tree tells the stories of The Huia Birds, The Hoiho and the Kakapo.

We are continuing to work on the piece creating the puppets, music and the animation.

In the meantime, we are looking to the future as to how best continue our work- creating theatre for the 3 - 7 year olds. Some of things under consideration are online documentaries on creating a new work, making simple puppets, Mask and movement workshop, creating movement and music for puppets. Theatre by its very nature is live, adding documentaries on how a work is being made may assist in schools booking a live performance.

We would love to hear from teachers if they would be interested in online materials that we may produce. The emergency Arts Funding from Creative New Zealand could possibly fund this activity.

A Whole Group Activity Purpose:

- A 'Getting to Know You' activity designed to promote the collective voice.
- Introduction of key drama related vocabulary and skills e.g. listen, chorus, line delivery,

warm-up, flourish, giving focus, taking focus, gesturing, bowing, flourish, direction, action,

prompt, rehearse, play, improvise, scene, character, conflict, resolution, feedback, theme.

DRAMA LEADER (DL) INSTRUCTIONS. STEP ONE

Resources required:

DL prepares coloured squares of rainbow coloured cardboard (red, orange, yellow, purple, blue, and pink) Provide enough squares for every class member of the class (one each).

DRAMA LEADER asks the group to stand in a circle. The Group Members (GM) number off around the circle. The DL lays the pieces of cardboard on the floor in random order.

DL Follow my instructions please. My name is (e.g. Emma). We are about to do a whole group warm up activity called The Rainbow Game. The game will help us to introduce ourselves to one another.

I'm to also going to introduce you to some drama vocabulary as we go. During the game you will become a chorus, chorusing what I say, in other words speaking together as a group. The purpose of this warm up is for you to make your actions and line delivery clear, welcoming and appropriate. We will be giving focus to each person in turn as they perform their action, and say their line and take focus when it is our turn to pick up a card and speak. Let's begin! Repeat after me:

DL (Announcing) We are a rainbow!

DL Repeat! (Cups a hand top the ear, listening)

Group: We are a rainbow!

DL (Coaching) You can use a bigger voice! "We are a rain-bow!"

GM We are a rainbow!

DL (Breaking off) Good work! Now we move to the next

stage everyone makes individual offers. I'll start. I'm going to choose a coloured card from those on the floor. Notice how I take a step forward in the circle, pick up a card and make a sweeping rainbow action with my arm as I deliver my line and then take a step back.

You then chorus what I say after I've said it, only you'll change the word "I" to "we".

DL takes a step forward and picks a Red card and makes a rainbow 'courtly bow / gesture' with an arm, showing the coloured card).

DL We are a rainbow and I am 'Emma Red'.

DL Now as a group you take a step forward into the circle, repeat the line, "We are a rainbow," but this time you add, "And you are Emma Red!" Copy the flourish I made like a courtly bow in my direction and send it back



to me as you deliver the line with energy and emphasis. Go!

DL and GM We are a rainbow and you are Emma Red! DL And we step back in the circle. Now it's your turn to individually introduce yourselves one by one with your Rainbow speech and gesture as I have done! As a group we will then copy and reflect back to you what you do so be bold, appropriate and courteous! Then step back into the circle.

DL invites a Group Member (GM) on their left to "Pick a card".

The GM picks a card and the game continues around the circle. If the GM begins to minimise their bow, flourish or vocal contribution encourage them to 'be bold'.

When everyone has taken part ask the group to sit down. If anyone starts losing focus during the warm up (e.g. off task behaviour) remind them to, 'Give focus to the actor' whose turn it is.

DL (Using a white board to record answers) Can anyone remind us of some of the drama terms we used in that exercise?

Chorus, line delivery, warm up, flourish, giving focus, taking focus, speech, gesture, bowing in a 'courtly' manner, action, drama game, warm up.

I hope this finds you and your loved ones well, safe and happy in this new normal.

As many of you will know Massive Theatre Company specialises in making new work either through devising or commissioning writers. Our work is often physical. It always starts with personal stories and experiences. We work with both emerging and professional artists. We tour nationally and internationally. Have a look at www.massivecompany.co.nz for a sense of who we are.

Below are some ways we are thinking might be useful in this time to support your work.

We are also keen to know how we can help and support you in this time. We are happy to consider any ideas that you have. We can jump on line and have a korero if you want.

Below is what we are offering so far from past productions we have on video.

One Video/one production is \$50 + GST and with this you get an education pack and script. 3 or more productions and it's \$120 + GST...same deal of Education pack and script per show.

You get a password to watch every show. We will change this at the beginning of next year so that we can ensure the safety of our shows. So it is in essence a subscription.

We also have to appeal to anyone purchasing these that they please don't share our property with others outside of the school.

The shows we have on offer in this form are:

- 1. The Brave (devised by the cast, co-directed by Sam Scott and Carla Martell) (professional cast, toured nationally and in a 5 venue tour in Hawaii).
- 2. The Wholehearted (devised by the cast, co-directed by Sam Scott and Scotty Cotter) (professional cast, toured nationally).
- 3. The Island (devised by the cast, co-directed by Sam Scott and Miriama McDowell) (emerging artists cast, toured to National Theatre of Scotland).
- 4. Sightings (written by Miriama McDowell, Fiona Graham and Denyce Su'a. Co-directed by Sam Scott and Kura Forrester) (emerging artists cast, toured to Northland). This show is clear to watch and listen to, but not edited, all on one shot, with close ups within the one shot).
- 5. Babble (devised by the cast, co-directed by Carla Martell and Scotty Cotter). (Emerging artists cast, recently performed in Auckland as part of the Auckland Arts Festival). This is still being edited but will be available very soon.

We can also offer you live on-line forums with a director/Directors for a fee. You don't have to have both Directors (even though co-directed), you can elect to just have one in the forum.

Directors will "unpack" the creating, making, rehearsing and presenting of the show with your students. They can also explain the design process as well as how they work with a sound designer/composer, stage manager, producer etc.

They will answer any questions about the show from both students and teachers.

We hope this helps.

I hope this newsletter finds you all well, and you are settling into your new routines trying to work from home during this pandemic. Keep in mind that Drama NZ is currently working on some online content/resources - in case you need them. Keep checking the Drama NZ Facebook page for other resources which Emma Bishop is regularly sharing. https://www.facebook.com/DramaNewZealand/

You don't need to be reinventing the wheel... there are lots of fantastic resources out there to help you, especially as these are stressful times. The thing to keep in mind is "less is more". With online learning, students may only get to cover around a 1/3rd to 1/2 of the usual content that they normally would. So you'll find that students don't have the capacity to cover lots of content. Don't beat yourself up if you are struggling with this new normal. If you need help, please sing out. Our fearless Prime Minister, Jacinda Ardern, quoted Nigel Latta in her address to the nation this week with: "Don't put too much pressure on yourselves". Great advice!



We must remember that we are not online learning, we are trying to teach from home during the middle of a pandemic/crisis, and not to be too hard on ourselves if things don't quite go the right way.


I've been pinning great resources and helpful tidbits for this online learning time.

One day I was teaching in the classroom and the next day schools were closed. Then there was the dilemma, our school was continuing until Easter. How was I supposed to continue my drama work 'online'?

For primary, I think 'online learning' poses specific challenges. I've suddenly had to plan activities and home learning that students could engage with in their bubbles, even juniors, with little support from parents. I've had to scan images, use online stories, and create worksheets, as little for primary-specific drama can be found online.

I was a third (since we've had so many disruptions) through the Year 6 unit I was planning on sharing at our Drama NZ Conference – The Doll's House.

The well-known Katherine Mansfield story written for adults, has been edited by Kevin Boon and illustrated by Trish Bowles, to be accessible to children as a picture book.



The prejudice, injustice, and bullying revealed in the story are still very relevant today, making it an ideal subject matter to explore in and through drama.

So my question was how to continue this unit 'online'.

Firstly, in our previous lesson students, in role as the Burnell girls', investigated the doll's house, describing its details in a short role play. This allowed them to build a word bank and create images of the intricacies inside. It gave us a chance to explore appropriate behaviour and language from when the story was set.

So the first home learning task was to write a letter in role thanking Mrs Hay for the doll's house. The students had to consider:

- A suitable way to begin and end their letter
- Language that was appropriate to the time and place
- Descriptions of their favourite part
- Where the doll's house would live

- Their sister's reaction

This task produced a wide variety of letters in a number of presentation styles.





The next story sequence involved the Burnell girls boasting to their friends.

Students had the option of writing or videoing themselves as one of the Burnell girls. To date I have received videoed monologues as the Burnell girls. One student chose to act as one of the friends and share this point of view. I've also received a scripted scene.

My Year 4 students wrote questions they'd ask a character in the story we'd been exploring, then had the option of videoing themselves in role, or writing responses.

Online learning is making me think and plan differently how I use technology; it's also allowed students to respond with greater individuality and creativity.

Executive Responses....

KIM'S COVID RESPONSE

The online resource that I've really liked has been from the Australian Institute for Teaching and Learning School Leadership. I liked it because it just made me think and relate what I already did, to the ideas they were saying were good practice in distance learning. Here is a link to the website that deals with online learning https://bit.

In particular, I liked the section that covered advice for teachers delivering content online and Resource 2a and 2b, that are accessible from the Contents page on the right hand side.

I read this first paragraph and considered how I could use those principles to adapt something I had taught online.

Principles for quality online/distance teaching

Evidence suggests that online/distance education operates best as a system of dynamic, interrelated components, which may vary in terms of implementation by context (Holmberg, 2005; Picciano, 2017). Together, these components (Figure 1) foster a learning community that is driven by pedagogy and incorporates a range of activities, which enables flexible delivery (Picciano, 2017). Constituent components can be adapted, combined or excluded as required, for example in some cases self-paced learning may not be used, or reflection activities may be combined with some form of collaboration between learners (Picciano, 2017). Using this model allows teachers to customise their content delivery to achieve their specific curriculum goals (Acquaro, 2020).

So, if I look at the first sentence and the words in red in terms of Devising I may have all of my students devising solo work because they're at level 3, and the Standards allow for that. But that doesn't mean that I can't still consider how their contexts are interrelated. In fact, you could start by considering the context that all of the students are in, which is that they are all at home, in the midst of a lockdown.

- What are some of the experiences they are having in lockdown?
- What are their concerns?
- What are they doing in order to get through lockdown? What routines do they have?
- What are their hopes at the moment?
- to lockdown
- What about important symbols?

You could start by setting up groups for them to chat through these ideas and then share commonalities with the entire class. This fosters the collaboration that's stated above.

Then ask them to consider a range of devising conventions to explore these questions:

- Do a diary entry that answers one of them
- Create a ritual/movement piece that shows their daily routine
- Find a poem, a speech that has been spoken by a leader, a song lyric and incorporate that into the diary entry/ the ritual
- Incorporate the symbol into the piece

You don't have to be present as they explore these things, or you may be, but you could also allow them flexibility to choose which of the activities they use.

Get them to share their work. This could either be in a group where they meet at their own time, or when you put them into breakout rooms on Zoom. When they share, the people in the group must give them 5 words that they saw/ felt/heard as important in the work. This also is part of the kind of reflection you would do in your classes, that are still possible online.

I'm not going to write this entire unit in this section, but this is where I'd get them to research previous pandemics and lockdowns. Ask the students to find various artefacts and stories from those times. Those stories may be from films, or articles, or Wikipedia or maybe from their own family stories.

Those artefacts could then be brought back to the group. Do the same questions as they did for themselves, but from the point of view of someone in the pandemic of the past. What's similar? What's different?

They could even create the same pieces to explore those ideas 'in space'.

Get them to slowly increase the bubble out from their house. What's interesting about what has happened locally since the lockdown? What has happened Nationally? What about Internationally? How much of an affect does each of those things have on their family bubble?

I'd then bring in political theatre. What is political about our situation now? What was political about the situation What are some of the key phrases/terms that relate then? What have we learnt/not learnt between then and now?

> Then, as you explore the major players, you could do some of that in groups.

At some stage you'll have to get the students to consider some aspect of lockdown that was different to what the other students were doing: Essential services and the irony that some of them are the lowest paid in society. The family unit and the stresses of lockdown.

While this idea considers principles of online learning, I'm hoping it also shows that most of the principles that are considered 'good practice' for distance teaching are the same as what we already use in our Drama classes; we just need to reframe them.

And that brings me to my final point. Don't reinvent the wheel.

What I've also just written is how I would start level 3 Devising 'in class'. I'm using an authentic, topical context and the prior knowledge of the students. That's what's at the heart of good teaching and learning. You've got a week of lockdown before we know they'll consider lifting Level 4, but at Level 3, we go back to school. Don't change anything too drastically; just alter things slightly to get through the next few weeks.

ONLINE TOOLS & ACTIVITIES FROM CHARLES

I have been using **Flipgrid**, a video recording and sharing app. I find it useful as it enables the children to perform and share their work, and for me to respond on the side. Even if this sharing is not live, the children are enjoying the performative and interactive aspects- it is keeping the shared sense of working as a class going. I am using it for my reading programme- for example making videos of me reading a story aloud that the children are then responding to in a variety of creative ways, including retelling.

Another, ongoing example is the children vlogging as influencers on a variety of themes and questions emerging from the lockdown. This activity brings out the natural facility kids have for role play- some of the posts are hilarious!

Another app suitable for home learning is <u>Storybird</u>- this provides so many creative ideas for story writing. One we are using is to make your own episode of Angry Birds as a

six frame storyboard which we are going to share and combine using G Suite apps. If you have not tried using Google Meet yet, this is a development of Hangouts and Chat that is easy to integrate and more secure than Zoom.



An activity you could use a variety of apps, conventions, and language modes for is transforming a room into an imaginary place.

What if your bedroom was a castle in a story, or a desert island etc. Or how might you turn your bathroom into a gym, or a passageway into a theatre. The guided tour convention is a good starter here- we will be adding music and sound effects to develop the first improvs. Initially, I negotiated the constraint that, for these transformations, the kids could only use objects naturally occurring in these places. I am planning to relax this so that the children use these new places as settings for stories, interviews etc



IDEA continues working during the COVID-19 Pandemic.



April ZOOM meeting.

Dear Members of IDEA,

The world has changed dramatically over night. Our countries are all under the same concern: to recover the health of the world. Our Executive Committee and the General Meeting Committee join forces to create new ways of communication in order to sustain our aims and purposes despite the strong changes of our communities.

IDEA usually holds a General Council Meeting during Congresses. With the cancellation of IDEA2020 Congress, Beijing July 5-9, the scheduled General Council Meeting now cannot be held.

Even though we are aware that it is very difficult to predict the future, we want to be optimistic and project ourselves into 2021, imagining that it will be a very important year to continue the process of transforming our new world with the arts in favour of education.

Therefore, IDEAS's General Meeting Committee in conjunction with the Executive Committee, is seeking expressions of interest from member organisations who wish to host the 2021 General Council Meeting (GCM) in the first three months of 2021.

As host, the IDEA member will work with the General Meeting Committee to identify:
