## With the holidays fast approaching here are some ideas from Emma Bishop for adding a little drama in the mix ...

Who remembers games night?

How about playing a game of HEADS UP? - get the kids interested by downloading the free version from Ellen on a smart phone or do it the old fashion way with a name stuck on their forehead.

CHARADES anyone? Practise your miming, challenge the family or the next-door-neighbours.

Make some play dough or get some plasticine or Blu-Tack and play - SCULPT IT or PICTIONARY or maybe TABOO - the word, guessing, and party game where the player has their partners guess the word on their card without using the word itself or five additional words listed on the card. How about encouraging the kids to create a scene or skit to perform after dinner - let them dress-up and settle in with some popcorn for a show. The adults could do one for the kids as well.




Both Samantha W and Cory are reading *Teaching to the North East; Relationship-based Learning in Practice* by Russell Bishop, so you know it's gotta be good!







Welcome to Hemo's weird and wonderful world with his quirky ghost whanau who raise him in the urupa, a mauri munching patupaiarehe, the spice girls and a mysterious ghost pig.

In just a few days Hemo will turn 10 which means he will finally be able to leave the safety of his urupā home and see the world - the only thing stopping that from happening is the Patupaiarehe 'Whitney' who needs to devour Hemo's mauri before he achieves this milestone. With the help of his Nanny Gugu and the rest of his ghost whānau Hemo only has to survive a few more days - but will the love of his family be enough to keep young Hemo safe.

Hemo is Home was written by Te Pou Theatre's Tainui Tukiwaho during lockdown 2022 and has gone on to be nominated for the NZ Playmarket Adam Award. This is a whānau story that gets a bit gruesome and shares matauranga Māori and the story of whānau love in a unique and inventive way.
