

## Show us the Money

Recently, at a regional AGM, there was discussion about accountability and where Networks of Expertise Funding (NEX) for Drama NZ has been spent.

All these details are available, including financials, in the minutes from our AGM held in April 2023. But to help clarify, here is an outline of spending for the NEX projects for the last three years.



In 2021 we received funding for two types of funding:

- A) Baseline funding to sustain and grow the association
- B) NCEA funding specifically for NCEA change and level 1 implementation support

Over the three years this is how we have allocated the funding:

#### A) Baseline:

- Administration Emma Bishop on a contract position to facilitate the NEX projects
- Advocacy produced resources that advocate for Drama across the sectors
- <u>Behind the Page</u> produced resources that relate to NZ playwrights. These interviews sit on our website
- <u>Running a Department</u> resources created about running a Drama department
- PCT created an online support network to support beginning teachers



- Primary/Intermediate Sector Literacy programmes using Drama in schools pilot programmes to mentor teachers in using Drama cross curricular in kura across NZ
- Whakamana Mana Reo Primary Conference
- Primary Resources



- Secondary Resources created several resources / units that sit on our website
- Reaching the Edges online workshops and hui to support people during covid recorded that now sit on our website
- Scholarships for teachers to attend national and international conferences
- Tertiary Hui for tertiary educators, online workshop on writing practitioner research
- GO III A CARACTER III
- HOD mentoring experienced HOD mentoring beginning HOD's both face to face and online
- Insurance and Accounting as part of NEX we are required to have insurance and we have updated our accounting capabilities
- Whirimanga the setting up of an allied Arts organisation that will support educators in all four arts disciplines across the sectors
- National Administrator contracted to support the increased load from growth and projects
- Face to Face Hui for our National Executive to run the organisation

- Website / Logo continued updating of logo and website to reflect new resources and members
- **B)** NCEA change This Funding has been spent predominantly this year (2023) as details, resourcing and pilot information became available.

- Te Rākau Theatre workshops nationwide
- Supporting roll out of NCEA change with workshops around the country
- Face to Face huis including governance training for the National Executive
- Scholarship Mentor programme

In Term 1 2024: we intend to finish off this NEX round of funding with these projects

#### A) Baseline:

- Behind the page further interviews with Theatre Aotearoa Playwrights
- Establish an online support network for Māori kaiako

- PCT continue online support with possible face to face
- Primary Resources three more to be created plus the creation of a book of resources
- Establish phase three to develop leadership in school with online support, one on one mentoring and regional workshops
- Face to Face hui for the National Executive with additional governance training
- Tertiary hui possible online for kaiako and students for pathways
- Website Overhaul to incorporate Te Reo as appropriate and make navigation and resource acquisition more user friendly

#### **B) NCEA NEX**

- Mātauranga Māori resources
- Māori Drama Practitioner interviews
- NZ theatre company interviews
- Resources to support the NCEA change available for all Drama teachers
- NCEA workshops for level 1 support these workshops in Term 1

This round of NEX Funding finishes in December - but we have just received notification that this will extend to the beginning of Term 2, 2024. As we are unsure of whether we will be successful for the next round we are working on two budgets for moving forward into 2024 - One with and one without NEX funding.

We have been growing steadily, but carefully in full consideration of the possibility the NEX funding may not be available after this final round, but that the Association needs to remain strong so that moving forward it can continue to support you, our members. You will see that this list above doesn't include things like Practice Exams as these sit outside NEX funding and we will continue to maintain our core focus of: Create/Auaha, Communicate/Whakaari, Educate/ Whakaako.

We are feeling very positive about moving forward into the next few year with a strong strategic plan and a clear path ahead. We hope you are, too.

### A Letter from Anna Richardson

Kia ora e hoa ma,

It is with mixed emotions that I let you all know that I have recently resigned from the Ministry of Education and my role of NCEA Implementation Facilitator. From the end of January next year, I will be moving back into the school environment.

New Interview series brings visibility to Māori Theatre Practitioners and NZ Theatre Companies

The three days of recording in Tāmaki took place at Te Pou Theatre. This was a perfect venue with a strong sense of wairua.


Kia pai te whakatā,

## Summer Yum!

The holidays are for sharing and our National Executive decided this year to share some of their favourite recipes for a refreshing summer salad. Check out all the delightful recipes on the following pages and have yourselves a Merry and a Bright!

### From Annette:



### Nadia Lim's Beetroot and Feta Salad

#### **INGREDIENTS**

red wine vinegar 3 tablespoons
sugar 1 teaspoon
red onion ½ thinly sliced
beetroot 3 large or 4 medium peeled, cut into 2-3cm
cubes
olive oil for cooking
raw almonds ½ cup chopped
garlic 3 cloves chopped
ground sumac 1 tablespoon
chilli flakes ½ teaspoon
baby spinach and/or baby beetroot leaves 120g
medjool dates 4-5 or 6-8 regular dried dates, chopped
feta 75-100g crumbled
extra virgin olive oil for dressing salad

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Preheat oven to 200°C. Line an oven tray with baking paper.

In a bowl, mix vinegar and sugar. Add onion and toss to coat. Set aside in the fridge to marinate for about 20 minutes while you prepare the rest of the salad.

On the lined tray, toss beetroot with a good drizzle of olive oil and season with salt and pepper. Roast for 25-30 minutes or until tender.

Heat a drizzle of olive oil in a frying pan. Cook almonds and garlic for about 2 minutes until golden. Turn off heat and mix in sumac and chilli.

When ready to serve, drain red onion (reserve vinegar) and toss with salad leaves, beetroot, almonds, dates and feta. Dress with extra virgin olive oil and some reserved vinegar.

#### **NOTES**

Marinating the onion for this recipe in a little vinegar and sugar is key to this salad! It softens the onion and gives it a nice pickled flavour, which is delicious with creamy feta, roast beetroot and spiced almonds.

Sumac is a reddish purple powder made by grinding up dried berries from the shrub of the same name. It has a tart flavour (much like lemon) and adds a lemony taste to many Middle Eastern dishes. I recommend you try to seek some out, but if you can't find it you can substitute it with a little lemon zest or leave it out altogether from this recipe.

### From Kimberley:



### Mary Berry's Creamy Potato Salad

#### **INGREDIENTS**

500g baby new potatoes

- 4 tbsp olive oil
- 3 tbsp Dijon mustard
- 1 tbsp caster sugar
- 3 tbsp white wine vinegar
- 6 tbsp mayonnaise
- 1 bunch spring onions, thinly sliced

150g radishes, thinly sliced

4 celery sticks, finely chopped

1 small bunch flat leaf parsley,

finely chopped


Salt and freshly ground black pepper

### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Put the potatoes in a pan of salted water and bring to the boil. Cook for 15 minutes, or until tender. Drain and slice each potato into quarters.

Mix the oil, mustard, sugar and vinegar together in a large bowl. Add the hot potatoes and season with salt and pepper. Stir and set aside to cool.

Add the mayonnaise, spring onions, radishes and celery, mix together well and check the seasoning. Stir in the remaining lemon juice. Enjoy. Perfect for the festival summer buffet!



#### **INGREDIENTS**

1 packet cos Romaine hearts halved

1 punnet strawberries sliced

½ cup dried cranberries or Craisins

1 small bunch of green grapes seedless is best

1 firm ripe avocado diced

½ cup mixed nuts almonds, walnuts, brazil nuts

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Arrange all salad ingredients on a festive platter.

Once it's looking colourful and enticing, drizzle a favourite dressing or vinaigrette over the top to bring out the Christmas zest. Serve as a perfect accompaniment to your festive feast.

### From Dinna:

#### **INGREDIENTS**

Some Kiwi Fruits
Some Strawberries

### **INSTRUCTIONS**

Cut them up and throw them on a platter in the shape of a pine tree.

Dinna doesn't cook!



### From Sam W: Blue Cheese, Pear and Walnut

#### **INGREDIENTS**

Mesclun salad mix
Fresh or canned peers
Walnuts
Creamy blue cheese
Balsamic vinaigrette dressing
Bacon



#### **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Lightly toast, the walnuts placed them aside to cool.

Chop the bacon into small pieces and fry until crisp. Remove to cool.

Slice the pears and place them into the same pan

as the bacon, gently fry until a little bit golden.

Spread the mesclun salad onto a large platter sprinkle over the toppings, squirt over the vinaigrette and then crumble up the blue cheese and serve.

### From Sam B: Broccoli Salad

The first step in this broccoli salad recipe is chopping the broccoli. Make sure to cut the florets into bite-sized pieces and to finely dice the stems. The small pieces will soften and soak up the dressing better than larger pieces will.

Next, you'll mix up the homemade broccoli salad dressing. Instead of using the typical 1 cup mayo: 2 tablespoons vinegar ratio for my broccoli salad dressing, I replace some of the mayo with olive oil and up the proportion of vinegar. I also add a few teaspoons of Dijon mustard and a little honey to the mix, making for a light, super tangy dressing with a delectable sweet/salty flavor.

Add the broccoli, red onion, and dried cranberries to the creamy dressing, and stir to coat.

Now for the best part: the smoky tamari almonds and pepitas! They add wonderful crunch to the salad and bring richness and smoky flavor. They're the perfect nutritious substitute for bacon and cheese. They're easy to make—toss the almonds and pepitas with tamari, maple syrup, and smoked paprika, and toast in a 350°F oven for 10-14 minutes, until golden brown. Top the salad with the nuts.

Season to taste, and enjoy!
